II. MEETING MINUTES

President's Report: Loorya announced that PANYC has received 5 new member applications.

Secretary's Report: Linn will send out a copy of the March General Meeting minutes via email for approval. Linn thanked Geismar for her excellent job taking the March minutes on Linn's behalf.

During the Board meeting, Linn suggested setting up a Google Docs or Dropbox account for PANYC so that there is one central place for current membership lists, documents, etc. for Board members to share. Britt and MacLean pointed out that Dropbox works better for Mac users and that it might be a more secure site than Google Docs. The Board agreed this was a good idea, and MacLean will set up an account.

Treasurer's Report: Geismar reported on behalf of Spritzer that, as of 4/30/13, PANYC had 33 paid members and \$3697.11 in the bank.

Committee Reports:

Archive: Geismar reminded members that PANYC's archives are formally at the City Hall Library downtown; a copy of each newsletter is currently sent to that library. There are some materials (a static archive), however, at the South Street Seaport Museum (SSM). We need to decide what to do with these materials at the SSM.

By-Laws: Stone reported that the By-Laws Committee has suggested that any changes that the committee has put forth that the Board did not reach a consensus about should be revisited before being presented to the General Membership. The Committee also suggests discussion of two new issues. 1. Elections: In the past more people have been asked to run for election to the Board than there are seats, leading to some people losing in the election, an exclusionary practice that should be reconsidered. This process and the nominating procedure, in general, will be discussed and possibly changed. 2. The question of who can attend PANYC general membership meetings has been raised recently and should be discussed as well.

It was suggested that the Board have another separate meeting to discuss these and other issues related to the by-laws before the September meeting.

Education: Britt has volunteered to join Linn and MacLean on the Education committee, and the three plan to meet sometime over the summer to discuss possible outreach strategies.

Event Planning: Loorya proposed forming a new committee to coordinate PANYC events for upcoming General Membership Meetings. Loorya and Ricciardi volunteered for this committee. The Outreach Committee was eliminated due to inactivity. It was thought that the Event Planning Committee could take on some of the responsibilities of the Outreach Committee, since a major goal of the Event Planning Committee is to increase membership and encourage more members to attend meetings through talks and events.

HHT: Linn related that she receives emails from the HHT about their events and asked if members were interested in them. Members said they were and that Linn should forward the announcements to Martin for the PANYC calendar of events. Members also asked Linn to email Frank Vagnone, Executive Director of the Trust, to ask if the Trust might need more interns.

LPC: Geismar reported that Sutphin is aware that the NYC Dept. of Health laws about burials, requiring archaeologists to employ funeral directors to transport archaeological human remains, is problematic for archaeologists.

Membership: Five new members have applied to PANYC, Camille Czerkowicz, Diane George, Eva Hulse, and Timothy Kotlensky, and Theodor Maghrak. All were approved, one with the provision that he will not become a member officially until he completes his MA at the end of the summer, so as to fulfill all of PANYC's requirements for membership.

Met Chapter: Rothschild and Wall are the new co-presidents of the chapter. The next Met Chapter event is on Tuesday, May 21st. Joe Schuldenrein will speak at Columbia University (951 Schermerhorn Ext.) at 6pm. In September, Jean Howson will speak about her work in Newark. There is also a plan in the works for a chapter trip before the end of the month to the Seneca Village exhibit at City College and to the exhibit about the need for a repository for NYC's archaeological finds at Columbia.

Newsletter: Members thanked Ricciardi for another excellent newsletter. Ricciardi encouraged members to contribute to the newsletter. He hopes especially to include short updates about current fieldwork. Please send him a paragraph or two and a photo.

The costs to produce the newsletter are now very low, because almost all of the members have elected to receive electronic copies. Only 3 copies are sent in hardcopy by mail.

NYAC: Stone reported that she and Geismar attended the last NYAC meeting in Watertown, NY. The program focused on the state burial bill. Mackey (former senior scientist with the OPRHP) and Anderson (head of the NYAC committee about the bill) spoke. Sutphin also shared her comments. Each of the three gave their own personal opinions about the bill; they were not representing the agencies for which they work.

The current draft of the bill is problematic for many reasons. Primarily, it does not address the funeral director issue. Anderson will be meeting with Assemblyman Englebright's staff to discuss PANYC's and NYAC's concerns about the bill. Anderson is optimistic and believes that the committee in charge of revising the bill will address our concerns and reissue a draft of the bill. The new version of the bill has more supporters in the legislature than the earlier version.

Anderson and Mackey suggested that PANYC, NYAC, and other archaeological organizations in the state provide a letter of support to Assemblyman Englebright, when the bill incorporates the changes that NYAC and PANYC have recommended. Stone suggests that both PANYC as an organization and members of PANYC as individuals send a letter of support. The latter are especially important. NYAC will put together a template that Stone will distribute to PANYC members once Anderson meets with Englebright's staff and has a better sense of the direction the bill is headed.

Stone reminded members that the next NYAC meeting is in the fall in Albany. The theme will be archaeology related to disaster and emergency management issues.

Parks: Geismar reports that there has been some debate about what to do with the headstone that was uncovered during her excavation of Washington Square Park. There is some concern that it would rapidly degrade if displayed outdoors.

Public Program: Members thanked Loorya for organizing this year's successful public program. There were approximately 104 attendees. A few people reportedly went to the South Street Seaport Museum, because they did not know about or remember the change in venue. Members pointed out that next year we should make sure that the curtain on the stage does not obstruct presenters from seeing their own slides.

Repository: Geismar reports that the former space of NY Unearthed, which had been a potential repository site, is no longer a possibility because it was so badly damaged by Hurricane Sandy. It was totally flooded and would have to be completely gutted and rebuilt.

The idea of using Fort Totten seems to have evaporated.

Rothschild's Museum MA students' exhibit at Columbia is about the need for a repository. Geismar said that it is a wonderful and well-presented exhibit that everyone should go to see.

Website: Loorya reports that the email account connected to the PANYC website only has 1MB of capacity and was therefore put out of order when someone sent a large attachment. A few people told Loorya at the Public Program this year that they had tried to email PANYC and their emails were returned as undeliverable. Loorya thus suggests we update our account to one with greater capacity. Pickman will research other plans. Britt and Loorya volunteered to work on the website committee. Current website committee members are thus Pickman (chair), Stone, Rakos, Britt, and Loorya.

Old Business: None

New Business:

1. Hedy Page's Paintings and Memorabilia: Cantwell related that Hetty Page came to the Public Program and inquired about contacting archaeologists who had worked at the Five Points site to help her complete a painting she made of the excavation. She is a painter of archaeological sites who lives in Long Beach. Cantwell says that her paintings are beautiful and that the MCNY has one.

On each of her paintings, Page lists the names of the archaeologists she depicts, but she is having trouble completing the Five Points painting. She has completed outlines of figures and has photographs of faces of the archaeologists, but needs help putting together the faces with the bodies. She also hopes that the archaeologists will be willing to write about some of their reflections about the site.

According to Cantwell and Stone, Page has a whole archive of things from the archaeological sites she had painted, such as menus, newspaper articles, and photos, and that a museum might be interested in archiving it. Stone related that Page told her at the Public Program that Page was worried that all of her memorabilia might be destroyed in the next big storm by flooding at her house. Page also said that she thought there should be some kind of educational program about archaeology outside of schools for children, because she is always so inspired by the enthusiasm of children for archaeology.

Cantwell suggests that PANYC help Page to show her work, perhaps at next year's public program or at a place like Fraunces Tavern. Loorya suggested an online exhibit of Page's work, where archaeologists who worked on the Five Points site could contribute. Loorya volunteered to photograph Page's paintings. Members believed that a combination of an online and offline exhibit would be ideal, and perhaps the MCNY would be interested, because they already have one of her paintings. The SSM might be another good venue, given that a lot of Page's paintings are of sites downtown.

The newly formed Event Planning Committee will pursue these ideas. Cantwell will send Loorya Page's contact information.

Secretary's Report: The General Meeting minutes from September were submitted and approved with one additional change to add Cantwell to the list of members on the Solecki Committee. A motion was put forth that the general meeting minutes will go out to those at the PANYC meeting within 1 calendar week. The members would then provide the Secretary with any comments/corrections/addition within a reasonable amount of time. The minutes would then be finalized, resubmitted to the members via email and a formal vote of approval of the Minutes would occur within a reasonable amount of time. The motion was unanimously approved.

Treasurer's Report: Spritzer reported that, as of today, PANYC has 34 paid members and \$3575.29 in the bank. TD Bank now requires a minimum of \$2,000 in the bank. A discussion followed regarding membership dues and the financial health of the organization. A motion was put forth to increase the dues from \$15 to \$20 per year to cover the rising costs of doing business (even as a non-profit). The motion was unanimously approved. Beginning in 2014, membership dues will be \$20.

President's Report: Loorya gave a brief overview regarding the movement of the By-Laws committee (see below for details). She also stated it was time for moving ahead with the Nomination committee (see below). She updated the membership on the recent CNEHA conference and how it was excellent, but the multitude of concurrent papers made it difficult to see a full session. She reported that there will be several sessions and papers on various NYC projects at the upcoming SHA conference and encouraged everyone to attend. She concluded with a brief update on the Solecki committee (see below).

Committee Reports:

Archives: It is still unclear as to the ultimate objectives of the Howard Hughes Corporation regarding the South Street Seaport and the South Street Seaport Museum. Loorya was directed to write the Corporation informing them that our archives reside in the Museum's Library and that if the library is to be dismantled, PANYC would like the opportunity to remove its documents.

By-Laws Committee: Committee Chair Stone formally presented the Board recommendations for by-law changes. A spirited discussion started on the concepts that had previously been approved by the Board. Additional opinions, focused on the concept of "Board Only" meetings and what the two membership meetings should/could be like, were held. It was stated that there should be more meetings than currently held – not fewer. Discussion turned to how to get more PANYC members involved. The Law Clinic at Columbia, which assisted in 1999 with the original drafting of the by-laws, may be willing/able to assist after the New Year with the process. The committee will begin the process of drafting the actual language for changing the by-laws that will be voted upon by the membership.

Elections and Nominations Committee: It was decided to combine the Elections and Nominations Committee together as their work goes together. As it is time to get nomination requests out to the general members (in December), the Committee was formalized. Loorya, Rakos, Ricciardi, Rothschild and Stone will serve.

Met Chapter: The recent Met-Chapter meetings (the walking tour and the lecture on the recovery of human remains from the World Trade Center site) were discussed. December's meeting will be on residue analysis.

NYAC: Stone reported that NYAC is looking into professional qualifications and if/how such a concept could be used in New York State. The spring 2014 meeting is in Oneonta, NY, and will include a program focusing on the professional qualifications issues. In the future, the format of the fall meeting will include a site visits instead of a program. NYAC is also in the process of updating their web site and will invite NYSAA to share the url creating one portal for all NYS Archaeology.

Newsletter: November's newsletter contained a "what's going on in current NYC archaeology" update and Ricciardi continued to encourage all to submit a "current activities" post.

Public Program: It is unclear if the Museum of the City of New York (MCNY) will be open for programming in 2014 as they are currently undergoing renovations. Stone, the Program Committee chair, will reach out to the MCNY. Loorya will provide her with the point of contact. Although the program is not fully developed, it will be dedicated to Ralph Solecki.

"The Solecki Committee": Wall and Cantwell reported, via Ricciardi, that the gathering of information continues. Geismar interviewed Solecki. Loorya and Ricciardi scanned many of his photographs, although they believe additional images may still reside at Columbia. Wall and Cantwell have been gathering articles and will also meet with Solecki in November. The issue of copyright came up and it is unclear what, if any, permissions are required. The committee will continue to look into the copyright question.

Website: The Committee will be meeting shortly. Homework assignments were given out to the Committee to bring sites that they like the "look" or "idea of" to the meeting. All agree the site must be "active" and not just "informational."

Old Business:

Bob Diamond, who apparently has initiated or intends to initiate litigation in regard to his access to the Atlantic Avenue Tunnel, posted a web page making false and libelous statements against PANYC. He cites and falsely interprets the Newsletters on PANYC's website. Loorya to draft a response to Diamond's attorney of record stating the page must be removed and retracted.

New Business:

NYC is attempting to delete major portions of the City (and State) Environmental Quality Review Act. Specifically, Parks wants to eliminate the responsibility to undertake cultural resource management on projects/sites involving less than 10,000 square feet. The concern this will drastically reduce, if not eliminate entirely, the established process regarding archaeological investigations associated with capital projects. Loorya to draft a response on behalf of PANYC and the membership will be encouraged to do the same. She will also provide a copy of the proposal to NY SHPO as the proposed changes also cite the SEQRA as well.

50 Broadway – a general overview of the results were provided to the membership.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:55PM



This letter is in regard to your client, the Brooklyn Historic Railway Association (BHRA). It has recently come to our attention that BHRA makes several inflammatory statements and accusations against PANYC on its website (<http://www.brooklynrail.net>), more specifically at <http://www.brooklynrail.net/PANYC.html>.

Your client, through BHRA, accuses PANYC of “obsession, vendetta, municipal influence peddling, conspiracy, fraud and general public corruption.” Your client also accuses PANYC of a “GRAFT ORIENTED relationship with the Bloomberg administration.” Not only are these statements false, they are libelous.


Your client further goes on to state “...proves PANYC's intent at ‘influence peddling’ and GRAFT through a PANYC member (Sutphin) employed at the NYC Landmarks Preservation Commission, by securing NYC contracts for PANYC through the influence of Sutphin's position at the Landmark Preservation Commission, and also by striking up a ‘personal relationship’ with NYC Mayor Michael Bloomberg.”

Ms. Sutphin is not a PANYC member nor has she been a member of PANYC during her tenure as Director of Archaeology with the Landmarks Preservation Commission. Additionally, PANYC is not a commercial organization but a not-for-profit 501(c)3 dedicated to the advocacy of archaeological protection within New York City. PANYC has never had any contract with the City of New York.

Your client has publically made false and libelous statements influenced by personal opinion and interpretations of correspondence and other PANYC materials. PANYC requests these statements immediately be removed from the BHRA website and that a letter retracting the statements cited above be publically issued.

As we believe that you are actively working with The City of New York and the community on how best to reinvigorate the SSSM, we wanted you to be aware of this aspect of the collection.





Re: Rule Designating Thirteen (13) Actions as Type II, which Will Not Require Environmental Review Under the City Environmental Quality Review

Dear Mr. O’Brien:

Professional Archaeologists of New York City (PANYC) is concerned with the proposal to remove portions of the City (and State) Environmental Quality Review Act. This law currently provides that any group or agency using public money for a project must at least consider, and potentially mitigate for, actions that may impact both the physical and the cultural landscape, including buried cultural resources. Because of this law, important discoveries have been made, including recent discoveries pertaining to the eighteenth century Bridewell in City Hall Park, a former cemetery in Washington Square Park, and a cistern full of mid to late nineteenth century material remains recovered from John Bowne Park. These finds, have captivated the public, enhanced development projects, and increased our knowledge of the city’s past while causing neither delays nor setbacks to these projects.

The current proposal, if passed, would eliminate consideration of irreplaceable and, potentially significant archaeological resources. The proposal changes of greatest concern are:

Type II. The following actions are not subject to review under City Environmental Quality Review, the State Environmental Quality Review Act (Environmental Conservation Law, Article 8) or the SEQRA Regulations, subject to § 5-05(d) of these rules:

(8) Construction or expansion of primary or accessory/appurtenant park structures or facilities involving less than 10,000 square feet of gross floor area;

(9) Park mapping, site selection or acquisition of less than ten (10) acres of existing open space or natural areas;

If enacted, these changes would excuse The City of New York – Department of Parks and Recreation, among other City agencies, from having to consider even basic cultural resource management issues (i.e., archaeological studies/surveys). This invalidates established federal, state, and city laws intended to address, and if possible, protect potentially significant aspects of our City's buried history. Cultural resource studies also provide the Parks Department and other City agencies with invaluable information for public interpretation and use.

The proposed exceptions will set a precedent for agencies to avoid following the rules and regulations that other municipalities, as well as the Federal Government, adhere to when undertakings are publically funded. These are laws that initially put New York City in the forefront of preservation.

The Federal Government and most major municipalities in the nation are required to undertake an environmental review when public funds are used. Creating exceptions for these two above referenced rule changes will leave an easy loop-hole for agencies to avoid following the same rules and regulations that are nationally recognized as essential to preserving our history. The importance of New York City in this nation's history makes this particularly tragic.

We request that Section 5-05(c)(8) and (9) be removed from consideration. If approved, they would give license to destroy important traces of the city's past without the least consideration of what could or will be lost. Once destroyed, they are gone forever. We request that you refrain from undermining the current the CEQRA/SEQRA that protect the irreplaceable cultural resources that enrich our city for all future generations.

And from the Public Hearing regarding the CEQRA Issue, the following is the printed statement from Joan Geismar.

My Name is Joan Geismar, and I represent Professional Archaeologists of New York City (PANYC). We are appalled at proposed changes to the City (and it appears the State) Environmental Quality Review Act. As described in Numbers 8) and 9) of *TYPE II ACTIONS* made available to us, the proposed changes would excuse the NYC Department of Parks & Recreation from archaeological considerations on properties of less than 10, 000 square feet gross floor area and less than ten (10) acres of existing open space. The established laws have resulted in archaeological documentation of hitherto lost burial grounds on Parks' property and other aspects of our city's impressive but hidden history. Washington Square Park and City Hall Park, where burials have been archaeologically encountered, and Battery Park, where colonial-era constructions have come to light, are only a few examples of historical resources that have been revealed and documented without halting construction. The proposed exemptions are precedent-setting changes that can only undermine archaeological research that has resulted in amassing invaluable historical information and the protection of sensitive sites. We urge you not to tamper with these requirements. Thank you.
