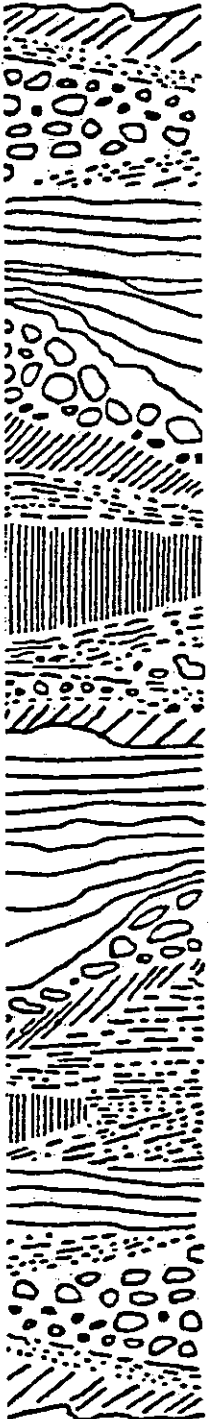

This represents a net increase in assets (surplus) for the year 2002 of \$256.12.

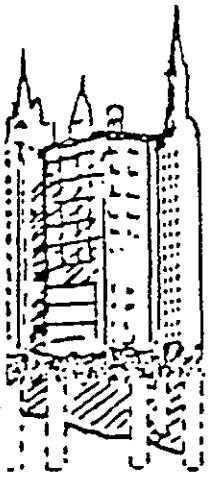

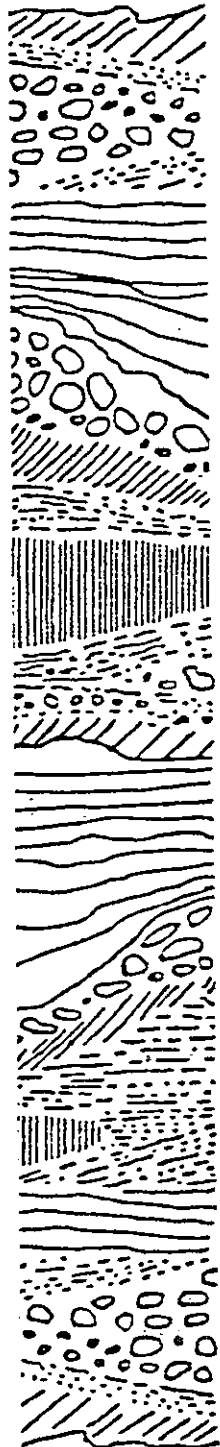

Notice of Intent To Prepare a General Management Plan and Environmental Impact Statement

AGENCY: National Park Service, Interior.

SUMMARY: Pursuant to section 102 (2) (C) of the National Environmental Policy

[[Page 20027]]

Act of 1969, the National Park Service announces their intent to prepare a General Management Plan and Environmental Impact Statement (GMP/EIS) for Governors Island National Monument, New York. The 21.69-acre Monument contains historic Fort Jay and Castle Williams and other properties located on 172-acre Governors Island, which lies about 1/2 mile south of Manhattan. The Monument's GMP/EIS will propose a long-term approach to managing the Governors Island National Monument, and will be prepared in cooperation with redevelopment plans being prepared by the Governors Island Preservation and Education Corporation.

Consistent with the monument's mission, NPS policy, and other laws and regulations, alternatives will be developed to guide the management of the Monument over the next 15 to 20 years. The alternatives will incorporate various zoning and management prescriptions to ensure resource preservation and public enjoyment of the Monument. The environmental consequences that could result from implementing the various alternatives will be evaluated in the plan. Impact topics will include cultural and natural resources, visitor experience, park operations, the socioeconomic environment, impairment, and sustainability. The public will be invited to express concerns about the management of the Monument early in the process through public meetings and other media; and will have an opportunity to review and comment on a draft GMP/EIS. Following public review processes outlined under NEPA, the final plan will become official, authorizing implementation of a preferred alternative. The target date for the Record of Decision is February 7, 2006, 3 years from the date the Monument was established.

News from the CYBERHARBOR mailing list (cyberharbor@treebranch.com)

I would echo Ken's call for continued public participation in the creation of the management plan that will guide use of the 22 acre national monument.

Regional Plan Association is working with the National Park Service on its outreach for the management plan, including establishing a website, holding public meetings, creating newsletters, and organizing guided public tours of the Island starting sometime this summer.

NPS is planning on holding scoping meetings for the management plan early fall 2003, identifying issues and opportunities next winter, and presenting preliminary management alternatives in the spring of 2004. The final draft should be completed by May 2005.

This planning work by the NPS is to be coordinated with planning work being undertaken by the Governors Island Preservation and Education Corporation (GIPEC) for the rest of the 172 acre Island. Decisions being made by GIPEC include creation and programming of a 40 acre park and a waterfront esplanade. GIPEC is still getting off the ground but will start laying out their planning schedule soon.

they have been excavating. 18th century artifacts are absent, probably due to waterproofing of the structure which removed all earlier objects. Robert Watts bought the house in the early 1800s and named it after his ancestral home in Scotland.

Guidelines for the Use of Archaeological Monitoring as an Alternative to Other Field Techniques have been proposed by a joint N.Y. Archaeological Council and Professional Archaeologists of N.Y.C. sub-committee. The next step is getting these guidelines adopted as part of the NYAC Standards (*Standards for Cultural Resource Investigations and the Curation of Archaeological Collections in New York State*, NYAC 1994; adopted by the N.Y.S. Office of Parks, Recreation & Historic Preservation).

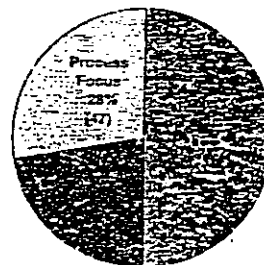
SCAA is currently mailing the *Standards...* to all Suffolk County Town Planning Departments and Chairs of Planning Committees so those making development decisions, which often affect archaeological resources, know what the State standards are.

Rose Hill Manor, on the Fordham University campus, has been excavated and studied for the past 15 years by archaeologist Dr. Alan Gilbert and historian Dr. Roger Wines of the Fordham faculty and their students. The story begins with a 1694 farmhouse built by a Dutch owner, Reyer Michielsen, which is probably the remains

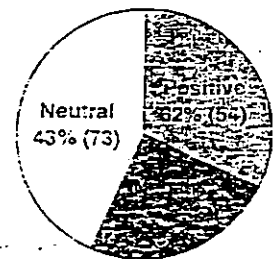
It was donated to the Diocese of New York in 1823 and transformed into St. John's College, which demolished the building in 1897, building a classroom partly over it. The site was renamed Fordham in 1907. 2002 was the last summer field school, as Dr. Gilbert plans to next excavate New York City's the last remaining Revolutionary War fort. Dr. Gilbert also created the region's Brick Archive and continues chemical analysis and identification of area bricks and brickworks. He is also a consultant to the Sylvester Manor project.

Archaeology Under a Microscope: CRM and the Press is a recent review of published Cultural Resource Management archaeology in the state from 1995 to 2000. 28 daily and weekly newspapers (L.I.'s Newsday included) reported on 53 different CRM projects. The SHPO reviewed and consulted on 1,965 CRM projects during this time; the 53 were only 2.7% which received newspaper coverage. The perspective of the articles was found to be positive 32% (54 articles), neutral 43% (73), and negative 25% (42).

Those articles which focused on the archaeology (22% - 38 articles) conveyed a very positive image of the discipline as interesting, scientifically important and worth attention. The largest category (50% - 84) dealt with development projects, often with a positive or negative bias. The third category, on the regulatory process (28% - 47), reported on regulatory procedures, SHPO functions, or the merits of archaeology versus economic development.
